

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## Adaptation in Scotland - Context



 Climate Change Scotland (2009) Act as been in place for ~12 years.



Climate Change (Scotland) Act 2009

 The Scottish Climate Change Adaptation Programme 2019-2024 takes an Outcomes-Based Approach and is integrated into National Outcomes and Sustainable Development Goals.



 There is a legislative requirement through the Public Bodies Climate Change Duties for all public sector organisations to report on adaptation progress.







One way we support the public sector, is through the Adaptation Capability Framework.



## Why did we develop the Adaptation Capability Framework?




The Adaptation Process commonly applied across Europe typically takes a risk-based, rigid, cyclical approach.

We recognised the need to support organisations at different stages of adaptation in a flexible and more holistic approach —extending beyond narrow risk focus.







## Learning from Practice





An expert working group co-created the new guidance. There was representation from a wide range of public sector organisations, including:

- Local authorities
- National Health Service (NHS)
- Universities
- Transport agency



Case studies informed the development of the guidance.

They also demonstrate the benefit of progressing the capabilities in the Framework.




A Benchmarking Working Group of twenty five organisations meets regularly to provide peer support on how to advance adaptation and benchmark progress.

- Collaboration is key working across sectors and silos to develop joined up approaches to adaptation.












