

Political priorities, old orthodoxies

recognition that many face structural barriers to keeping warm and keeping cool Hardest to reach residents are most vulnerable

lack of understanding of what adaptation is needed

local knowledge devalued

capacity, insight, funding, life stage

Lack of tailored of information.

Lack of resourcing. Top down
approaches. Very wide time ranges
for impacts from scientific
community.

Poor join up across policy areas - poor housing, low income, vulnerability, etc Competing pressures - need for more green space in certain parts of the city but also need for housing etc

old infrustructure

lack of infrustructure investment

old building and housing stock which has been poorly maintained







Lack of understanding of complexity

It is defined by those outside the community

Lack of community interconnectedness

Lacks stories of what it will be like for me

reaching disconnected/disengaged communities Too busy pulling people out of the water to figure out why they're falling in

Experts seen to have the answers and don't talk to the communities in most need of adaptation

Narrative technical not empathetic
