



A Local Plan for Lancaster District 2011-2031 Part Two: Review of the Development Management DPD July 2020



 A review of the adopted local plan - adopted July 2020

- The CELPR:
 - Acts on the climate emergency declaration- makes swift progress
 - First to get to this point in the UK through this partial plan review approach
 - Ensures Climate Change is at the heart of all decision making
 - Reviewing policies and creating new policies climate mitigation and adaption
 - Blue covered plan is the currently adopted one, the green covered one is the CELPR



How did we approach the review?

- Scoping Sept- Nov 2020
- Draft plan July- Sept 2021
- Publication Version January –
 February 2022
- Submitted to SoS March 2022.
- Examination (Including Hearings Autumn 2022).
- Now in post Hearings stage modification prior to adoption in early 2023.
- Plan contained changes in wording to MUST, SHOULD etc.



What does the CELPR say?

- Topic based
 - Water Management
 - Heritage considerations in the context of climate change
 - Green & Blue Infrastructure
 - Sustainable Design, Energy Efficiency & Renewable Energy Generation
 - Strategic transport





Key takeaways of the CELPR

All new approved housing- net zero carbon by 2028

It will help to minimise the risk of flooding

Has the potential to reduce fuel poverty

• Improves how the green and blue spaces in the district are connected and protects this

Focuses attention on renewable energy generation and storage

It will improve active travel and provide EV infrastructure



Top tips/ Learnings

- Strengthening wording. Clear and unequivocal. Only possible with strong evidence base.
- Political support from Members.
- Benefits of a well-resourced planning team
- Engagement with community & key stakeholders
- Developer Industry meetings/forums.
- Think of the co-benefits!
 - reducing overall energy use,
 - reducing occupant bills and helping alleviate fuel poverty and,
 - improvement for health and wellbeing reducing the need and cost burden for retrofitting.
